


# **Membership Renewal**

FSYC has a Cooperating Group Agreement with Boat US. If you are traveling on your boat, a Boat US membership can save you money. Many marinas, including some on the Ohio River offer discounts on fuel and dockage to Boat US members. Boat US has excellent boat and towing insurance. In addition, Boat US has won many legislative battles for the boating community. FSYC members can get membership for half price (\$12.50) by putting the group number (GA84331Y) on the membership application. Membership applications are available at the clubhouse. # **Safety Tip**

We have a lot of dogs on the docks during the summer. And every year, a few find themselves misjudging the leap on or off the boat and becoming canine members of the FSM swim team. I'm not here to remind owners to keep their dogs on a leash. I not even going to suggest you purchase a doggie life vest (available in the ship's store). But, if your child (I mean dog) ends up in the water in the marina around your boat, there are a couple of things you need to remember:

- **1) Do not panic**. The dog will most likely be able to keep themselves afloat until you can pull them out.
- 2) Hold them by the collar to keep them from going under the dock or swim platform until you can get an arm under the dog to lift them out of the water.
- *Yell for help.* You will most likely need assistance keeping the boat away while you pull the dog to safety.
- **4)** Try to get your arm around their backside to lift them out of the water. Do not lift from the dog's collar; they will be much heavier after being soaked and this could cause further injuries to the animal, or to you. Remember, you won't be able to help your pet if you panic or injure yourself.
- 5) Hose them down! This may be the most important thing you do. Most dogs won't care for being hosed down, (except Bailey) especially after just being pulled from the water. I don't think I need to explain the reasons for the hosing. Your dog can easily contract an illness from the stagnant water of the marina. You also do not want your child (I mean pet) back on the boat or to go down below, jumping into your bed before being cleaned.

**Jim Gibbons** - Tranquillity: Get Well Wishes for his heart related issues



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# **First Mate on the PA Denny**



After spending the spring and summer this year as First Mate on the P.A. Denny, a 1930's stern wheeler converted into a floating science lab for area school kids, I was asked to help take the boat to Point Pleasant WV to dry dock for repairs and inspections.

Six crew members left the old Mike Fink dock on a crisp October morning for the three day, 204 mile trip. After casting off, the first order of business, of course, was breakfast, and we all were happy to find out that one of our crew, Captain Frank's brother, enjoyed cooking and was more than happy to prepare breakfast to order that morning as well as all the meals for the rest of the trip. The boat was well provisioned and needless to say, we didn't go hungry.

The second order of business was where to tie up for the night. Making way at only seven MPH makes you plan well in advance. We knew we were going to make the dock wall at Huntington the second night, but there aren't a lot of options for a 100 foot, steel hull stern wheeler between here and there.

Our captain made contact with one of the cooks he knew from the Crounse barge line, and was given the number of their Maysville yard manager. After several long phone calls, we gained permission to tie off to one of their tow boats provided we agreed not to board their boats. Ten hours and sixty-four miles after departing Cincinnati and after a seamless lock through at Meldahl, we arrived at Crounse, were greeted by the manager, and once tied off, were able to relax and enjoy a beer and a meal. Card playing and storytelling were the entertainment for the night. We all turned in early (air mattresses and sleeping bags, not exactly first class accommodations) because the next day was going to be a long one.

We left Maysville at 5:30 knowing that the Greenup lock, four hours away, was under repair and could potentially cause a delay. Capt. Frank contacted the lock master early and was told we would receive priority locking if our timing was right. Frank pushed the throttle to the second notch and we were making a little over nine MPH, but to no avail. When we arrived, we had missed

our slot and were told we had a two hour wait.

We pulled into shore, and I explored it with Tony, one of the summer instructors. A marine biologist, he was a fountain of knowledge about river species, habitat, etc. and was also training to become a first mate. Tony was great to have aboard, and because he is about 6' 6" tall, we let him lasso the bollards in the locks.

After 96 miles on the water, we arrived at Huntington at 7:30, and flawlessly made the dock wall (my training was finally paying off) and almost instantly began to attract the attention of the locals. Another great meal, some beer and of course story telling ensued. As we readied our sleeping bags, Capt. Frank warned those of us who would bunk on the first deck to be ready for possible visitors during the night, but thankfully, we had no trouble.

Capt. Frank let us "sleep in" the next morning since our third day would be short (45 miles) so we didn't leave Huntington until 7:00. Our timing at the Robert C. Byrd lock was perfect, the gates opening almost upon our arrival, and we made our destination, the Madison Coal Company dry dock on the Kanawha River in Henderson, WV at 2:30.

The yard manager came aboard, started making measurements for the cribbing and was soon directing his crew. A very efficient operation, to say the least.

We took the afternoon to explore the Ohio River Museum in Point Pleasant – a very interesting, homey museum dedicated mostly to working boats and paddle wheel history. They also have a huge fresh water aquarium annex. Tony took the opportunity to instruct the curator in the care and feeding of gar, paddlefish, and other species in the aquarium while we examined the rest of the exhibits.

Returning to the boat, our chef prepared gourmet pork chops, mashed potatoes and green beans. The Madison Coal crew was coming on and off the boat and we invited them to stay for dinner, but they declined. At this point, we were all very thirsty and cracked a beer. Capt. Frank came in and asked me what I was drinking and immediately told me (first mate) to put it down the drain because we were probably moving to dry dock that evening.

Sure enough, at 7:30, we were told to fire up the engine and prepare for dry dock. The dock slowly sunk, the Madison Coal crew came on board, and we began backing into the dock. By 8:30 the dock was refloated under the P.A. Denny and we were out, on the dock, amazed at the entire process. These guys are pros, and I felt like

a tourist, taking tons of photos, but so what. I'm pretty certain I won't experience this again and didn't want to miss anything. We spent our last night on the boat (I finally got my beer) playing cards and telling stories (didn't I hear that one before?) in the dry dock.

The next morning one of Madison's crew said we were the only people he knew of to spend the night in dry dock, so I was right in thinking this was a once-in-alifetime experience. After breakfast and packing, I spent the morning exploring and taking pictures of the ship vard. The Orsanco company van arrived around 2:00 and we were back at ORSANCO by 4:30. Three days on the water to get there and 2 ½ hours to drive back....Life really did move at a slower pace in the old days.


